まえがき

宮崎大学附属図書館所蔵の「イギリス労働運動史家アラン・ハット旧蔵 世界労働運動史コレクション」について、編者は既に三度紹介を行い¹⁾、同コレクション目録の完成も図書館員とともに果たしている²⁾。けれども、編者は本年度を最後に宮崎大学から九州大学大学院へ転任することになっており、それを前にして同コレクションの第一推薦者として残された紹介を果たすこととする。それはアラン・ハット著作目録の第2部にあたるもので、著書以外の論文・記事・書評類の著作目録である。本著作目録のデータは、以下の3種類から採られた。

- 1) ハット自身の切抜帳 (M1 [コレクション目録の分類整理番号, 以下同様]) およびアルバム (M9) に収められた大量の切抜
- 2) 書評の対象となった書籍の表紙内側に貼られた切抜
- 3) コレクション中の雑誌を総点検して見つけれられた原物

収録もれの著作も、なお多く残されているであろう。印刷・ジャーナリズム関係の切抜は網羅して収められているように見受けられるが、それに比して、社会（共産）主義および労働組合運動に関する切抜類が少ないように思えなくもない。“The Communist Review”にはなお数点の論文もしくは書評が掲載されたことを、ハット自身メモ (M9) に記しており、“Daily Worker”などの記事の切抜は網羅されているのか、不安が残る。とはいえ、重要な切抜がもれている確率が高いとは考えにくく、未収録分の再調査を行うことは（日本で所蔵が確認できない新聞・雑誌もあり）労多くしてどれほどの意義があるのかについて消極的な判断に傾く。よって、本著作目録は同コレクションに収められているものに限定してまとめられた。本目録中のすべての著作が直に手にとって読めるものとなっている。

本著作目録の整理に関する説明は、凡例にゆずるとして、ここでは著作の内訳等について記しておく。

今回掲載する「論文、報告、記事類」は98点、「書評類」と「映画評」が83点、そして「雑録」が8点であり、合計189点にのぼる。なお、著書（共著、編著を含む）は、多くの改訂版

および翻訳書を除き18点を数える（前回紹介した著書目録では、コレクションが所蔵する著書のうち一部に収録もれがあり、訂正を兼ねて本稿末尾に、それらを追録させていただく）。

最も早い著作は、ケンブリッジ大学在学中の1922年9月の（フランス共産主義史家が第2インターナショナルを批判的に分析した『世界社会主義の危機：第2から第3インターナショナルへ』の英訳刊行を推奨した）書評であり、最後は72歳で亡くなる3カ月前の1973年5月3日のこれもまた（故ジョン・ストレイチーの評伝が出たのを機に痛烈すぎるほどに故人を批判した）書評である。ジャーナリズムに深く関わったハットの一大特徴が、その膨大な書評群に見られる。

もう一つの特徴は、新聞印刷術とそれに関連する著作にあり、それらは厳密に区別できないものもありあくまで概数だが、15点あり、全体の1割弱を占める。

いわゆる二足の草鞋を履くハットの経歴については、第一紹介論文を参照していただくとして、最後に、ハットをイギリス共産党指導者がどのように捉えていたか、特徴的な人物評を切抜（M9）から再録しておく³¹。

Allen Hutt 50 today

ALLEN HUTT, chief sub-editor of the Daily Worker, who is 50 today, has received the following letter from Harry Pollitt, general secretary of the Communist Party:

DEAR ALLEN,

I send you on behalf of our executive, our Party and very personally from myself, our warmest congratulations and good wishes on a very happy occasion—the occasion of your 50th birthday.

You have a record of service to the working-class movement and our Party that redounds to your credit, and of which both you and we can be proud.

Editorial work

It was while still a student at Cambridge that you first showed the direction in which your work was to lie by becoming an active worker for the Labour Research Department.

Less than two years after the Communist Party in Britain was founded you became a member, in 1922.

In 1923 you joined the editorial staff of the Daily Herald and at the same time you began your great work for our Communist Party Press by assisting in editorial work for the Workers' Weekly under the editorship of Comrade R. Palme Dutt.

Thereafter you worked in a wide variety of important journalistic jobs, Trade Union Unity, Tass, and very important indeed, in 1929 you joined the famous Sunday Worker.

What memories that conjures up! What a brilliant team! Led by the editor Walter Holmes, Ralph Fox, T.A. Jackson, Reg Bishop, and not least of that galaxy of stars, George Allen Hutt—all of you were staunch and devoted standard bearers of the great cause of Socialism.

It was only natural when the Daily Worker was launched in 1930 you should join its staff in the early months.

Later came your spell on the newly-modernised Reynolds News. Referring to this period, one of your

close colleagues has the following to say:

“Here he utilised fully most energetically and enthusiastically the opportunities afforded for mastering the technique of modern newspaper production and applying the knowledge and skill thus gained in the service of the working-class Press.”

Union executive

So in October, 1942 on the lifting of the ban, you rejoined our Daily Worker under the late Bill Rust's leadership, devoting yourself with unflagging zeal to making it the paper of which we are all so proud today.

I believe one of the most sincere tributes to your ability and loyalty to the cause of the working class, which represents the true interests of our people, is your election to the executive council of the National Union of Journalists, and your continuing success as editor of the union journal.

But there is another side to the picture upon which it is necessary to dwell, however briefly — your splendid contribution as a brilliant and outstanding historical writer, to the education and advance of the British working class.

Beginning, if I remember correctly, with “Communism and Coal” (jointly with Arthur Horner) your books include “The Condition of the Working Class in Britain,” “Tolpuddle and Today,” “This Final Crisis,” “The Post-War History of the British Working Class” and “British Trade Unionism” (and I am very pleased to learn you are working on a revised edition of the latter book, bringing it up to the present day).

The list is impressive evidence of how invaluable has been your contribution.

No one can gainsay that this wide, all-embracing and accurate knowledge of the British working-class movement is an invaluable asset in your journalistic work on the Daily Worker. In the same way, your experiences in the Soviet Union have fortified and strengthened your consistent friendship with and support of the Soviet people and their Soviet society.

I cannot set out in detail how unstintingly you strive to place your unrivalled experience at the service of our younger comrades on the paper. If you sometimes let fall a devastating remark that takes the hearer's breath away, we know it is because of your concern that everything will be done just meticulously right and on time.

Final victory

Nor will I dwell on you in the role of a father, inordinately proud of his offspring. Your loyal wife, family and other friends will doubtless use the occasion to do it.

I know you, our executive committee and the Party knows you, as an outstanding fighter for working-class emancipation.

So may you have a happy birth day and many, many more, some of which I am certain will be celebrated amidst our triumphal rejoicings at the final victory of peace over war, and Socialism over capitalism.

凡 例

1. 目録は、前回まとめた著書目録(Part 1)に続いて、「論文、報告、記事類」(Part 2)、「書評類」(Part 3)、「映画評」(Part 4)、「雑録」(Part 5)の4部に分け、それぞれ掲載順に配列した。
2. 索引をかねて、末尾に掲載紙(誌)別の著作目録を掲載した。掲載紙(誌)の順番は著作の最初の掲載が早い順になっている。末尾に(R), (M)が付された著作は、それぞれ「書評もしくは映画評」, 「雑録」であることを示し、それ以外は「論文、報告、記事類」である。
3. []内は、編者による注記であり、アルファベットと数字、たとえば[J11], [M1], [B584]はコレクション目録中の「J: 雑誌」, 「M: 草稿・切抜類」, 「B: 書籍・小冊子類」の各通し番号である。
4. 各論文、記事、書評類は、逐一初出紙(誌)にあたるのが鉄則であろうが、(まえがきに記載した理由により)大半は切抜に手書きされたデータどまりであり、巻号数とページのものが多いいことを断っておく。
